November 14, Abingdon Shoney's. Installation of officers for 2018. Speaker, Leigh Ann Hoover.



## **Inconsequential**

I am working on a mystery novel. I have never written a mystery so I was thinking about mysteries that I have read and their writers. Naturally one of those writers was Agatha Christie. What made her stories great? Her stories were in interesting places with interesting characters. Some of those characters remind us of someone we might know. Finally, there was always an interesting premise with the story. Then there was how she presented the mystery in the story.

I have heard people complain that Agatha Christie would spring clues and facts out of nowhere when it came time for the big reveal, but that is not strictly true. If you go back after reading the solving of the mystery you will find that usually everything was presented to you. In my opinion one of her great skills was in making the important seem inconsequential. The magician uses misdirection to take your eyes off what is happening behind the curtain. Dame Agatha had a genius for making things seem unimportant.

Don't believe me? Read the reveal and go back and look for those clues they mention. They are usually right there. Sometimes you wonder how you missed them the first time when you go back and look for them.

Literary misdirection is not just in mysteries it gets used in other genres also but the mystery is where it truly shines.
