



In Stray, Taliesin MacGuire promises his grandmother he will find out why his father left home, never to return, but few people have fond memories of his father and fewer want to talk. Echoes from Irish lore, the Lost Colony, and the Virginia witch trials weave strains of an ancient melody as Tal discovers that time silences the past and nonconformity is a howl in the night.

The Wolf Crystal is the story that inspired the Virginia Highlands Festival's new immersive theater. It is rooted in Abingdon's traditions and legends about the wolf caves and Daniel Boone's explorations through our region. The story unfolds over the course of the Festival dates, with new elements being introduced each day. The illustrated book is now available.
